Why I Became an RT

My name is Maria Lana Rudd, and I am a respiratory therapist. I graduated from Mohawk Valley Community College in 2006 and earned my bachelor's degree from SUNY Upstate Medical University in 2008. This year I graduated with my MBA-HC Administration, and I am the Director of Clinical Services at AdaptHealth over our Home Ventilator and Trach Program (www.adapthealth.com). I have three businesses: Maria Lana Respiratory Consultant Firm, Bellissima Scrubs, and Maria Lana Burn Foundation.

The reason I became a respiratory therapist...

On November 18, 2001, I was involved in a home explosion and suffered 64% 2nd and 3rd degree burns. I was placed in an induced coma for three months on a ventilator and with a trach. They told my family that my survival rate was very low. Three months later they woke me up and as you can read, I am alive and living my best life. I had to learn to walk, talk, eat, and use my hands all over again. My recovery took about two years, and many reconstructive surgeries still continue throughout the years.

Respiratory therapy saved my life. When I started college, I had never even graduated from high school and had no GED at the time. I believe that the Lord is using me to help others who have experienced life changing events which is why I have started Maria Lana Burn Foundation to help others reach their goals after a life changing event.

This was a very challenging time in my life. I am grateful for the life experience as it has brought me to my respiratory therapy career path where I have experienced so many blessings and have been able to guide and assist so many people. I am very passionate about respiratory therapy and helping others. Many people have stepped up and helped me, and I feel it is only right that I also help others. That is what helped me and saved my life.



Leslee Harris Smith, MS, RRT, 48, passed away on January 13, 2001 after a courageous life cut short by the devastating effects of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. Leslee was the Clinical Coordinator, and then Director, of the Respiratory Therapy Program at Northern Virginia Community College in Annandale, Virginia, from 1981 to 1996 when she was forced to slow down due to the consequences of her illness. Using distant learning and electronic technologies to overcome the physical limitations imposed by her disease, Leslee continued teaching part-time through the end of the Fall semester 2000. She was an active member of the Virginia Society for Respiratory Care, serving as chair of the educators group for many years. Her many contributions are recognized annually by the VSRC through its award of the Leslee Harris Smith Education Recognition Scholarship to students enrolled in respiratory therapy educational programs throughout the state.



Clinical Pearls >>>

One size does not fit all

In the year 2000, the Acute Respiratory Distress Syndrome Network published an article in the New England Journal of Medicine titled "Ventilation with Lower Tidal Volumes as Compared with Traditional Tidal Volumes for Acute Lung Injury and the Acute Respiratory Distress Syndrome". This article highlighted a landmark trial that compared patients receiving tidal volumes of 6ml/kg/pbw to 12/ml/kg/pbw. Not surprisingly the study group receiving the smaller tidal volumes had mortality benefit, even though oxygenationation was better in the control group receiving larger tidal volumes. Today, 22 years later, we now know that it is most likely NOT the size of the tidal volume, but rather the size of the tidal volume as it relates to the space available for volume in the lungs. In other words, if we compare two male patients, and both 5' 9" tall, by guidelines developed in 2000 we would give them both tidal volumes of ~ 420 ml in order to target 6ml/kg/pbw. Now imagine that one of these patients has significant diffuse consolidation consistent with ARDS and the other patient has lesser consolidation. The pressures generated in the lungs of the patient with ARDS will be higher than the pressures generated in the other patient. We quantify these differences by using pressures as a surrogate for the relationship between volume and the available space for volume in the lungs. In general, we now monitor plateau pressures, total PEEP, and ultimately driving pressure to help guide protective mechanical ventilation. 
